Figurative Language

Comparisons (Imagery)

Simile A is like or as B

Metaphor A is B

Personification Metaphor where an inanimate object is given living qualities

Other Figures of Speech

Sound Effects

Alliteration repetition of a letter at the beginning of a series of words

Assonance repetition of a sound in a series of words

Onomatopoeia where words imitate sounds

Pun play on words with similar sounds, but different meanings

Making a Point

Hyperbole deliberate exaggeration Litotes deliberate understating

Euphemism using inoffensive language to convey an uncomfortable truth

Circumlocution talking round a point; stating something indirectly

Contrasts

Paradox a contradiction which contains a truth

Oxymoron words with opposite meanings placed together

Juxtaposition placing side by side

Word Use

Neologism coining a new word

Archaism a word from the past, out of current usage Cliché once original phrases, now tired and overused

Sounds

Letter	Type of Sound	Sound Effect
b and p	Plosive	Hard
hard c, g, qu and k	Guttural	Harsh, often unpleasant
d and t	Dental	Neutral
f, th and v	Fricative	Can be unpleasant when combined with a short vowel
l, w and y	Liquid	Mellifluous and pleasant, but the w sound can be mean
m and n	Nasal	Usually pleasant
soft c, s and z	Sibilant	Soporific or hissing
r	Rolling	Almost like a vowel
